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Letter from John to Samuel

John Bennion joined the LDS
Churchin Liverpool, England in May 1841,
married Esther Wainwright in February 1842,
and the two of them left for America that same
month, arriving in Nauvoo in May 1842.
Meanwhile, Samuel married Mary Bushell in
1838, joined the Church in September 1842,
and came to Nauvoo in 1845. The following
letter was written by John to Samuel in
February 1844 — both were members of the
Church, but Samuel and his wife had not yet
emigrated. This is but one of many of John's
letters contained in our new Bennion Family
History Volume 4 -- History of John Bennion
by Ruth Rogers.

Nauvoo Sunday February 19 1844 Dear bro Samuel

I could not feel satisfied without writing to you a line though I have not much to write about now I have been several times at the post office expecting a letter from you

but have not yet recieved it I am ancious for you and all the rest of our family to be here you know according to Scripture all things have got to be restored if so the old man or patriarch is not to be separated from his posterity until death nor the children from the father but like good old Jacob who stood at the head of his family till a good old age and then called his sons together and blessed them this doctrine along with many other glorious truths have got to be restored in there place This patriarchal order is already entered into by many families in this city This fornoon we have been hearing Josepth Smith preach in the open air to a congregation of several thousands I rejoice in the truths which I hear from time to time All the tribulation and disappointment through which the Saints have to pass is forgotten when the glory and greatness of the Eternal worlds are placed before our mind It is then of the greatest importance that we keep the commandments of God given to his saints that we may escape the judgments which await the inhabitants of the earth My desire is that you and I with our Familys and conections may stand on Mount Zion where there shall be peace and safty I conclude by subscribing myself

your affectionate Bro J Bennion

There are several of my old acquintanses yet behind whom I expected to have seen hear before this time I dont know what hinders them I believe many more would come if

them I believe many more would come if they did not hear so many strange reports

Some folks expect to find here a Sunday everyday in the week and the people all rightious and if they find some one doing wrong they run away and report we are all a wicked people I would say if any are coming here looking for perfection they must not

here looking for perfection they must not forget to bring plenty with them, for this plant does not grow sponteniously here but we have to cultivate it with care or it will not grow at all but the soil here is fertile and plenty of room for it to grow I wish to be remembered to the Saints at Ewloe by Josepth Ellis the folks here are all healthy generally I intend to write more soon as opportunity serves for conveyance So no more at present

Your Bennion Family Executive Committee, speaheaded by computer whiz Steve Bennion, is tackling the ambitious task of maintaining a current database of all descendants of John and Samuel Bennion. This task was last tackled in 1963 and resulted in Bennion Family of Utah. Volume 2, a valuable resource item for all of us lucky enough to have a copy. Unfortunately, it's now about 30 years out of date.

The only requirements for volunteering are: 1) you own a computer (Mac or PC) and a copy of the LDS Church Family History software package (PAF); 2) you have some Bennion blood in your veins or your spouse's; and 3) willingness to track down a few of your cousins. John Bennion 's Death as Recorded by his Son, Samuel R.

John Bennion died from a horse accident on September 1, 1877 at age 57, leaving behind 3 wives and 21 children. 7 more children and an adopted son had preceded him in death, and his wife Mary Turpin was 8 months pregnant. John's oldest son, Samuel R. Bennion, was 34 years old and the father of 5 children aged 8 and under at this time. Samuel R. made the following entries in his journal. The original spelling and punctuation have been preserved.

Please note the tender intertwining of the families—John's, Samuel's, and their children's families.

Fri 31 We drove to the point of the Mountain I met Johney Jones their informed me that my Father had got cerious hurt that morning He went on to Rush for to inform the Family their I made hast home Hyrum drove the sock [stock] home got home 3 P.M. Dr their wateing on him had him under the influance of cloreform he Suffered great pain Supposed for to be a rupture Dr left late in the evening But before day began for to get worse From the first Sayed no body could do him any good Seemed for to think it was fatal to him Called his Family around him he being in Bro Webstur's house and wished his family to be united Cling to gether follow in his foot Steps and do as he had been counciled them His pain and Suffering was so great that he could not talk to us mutch

Sept

Sat 1 Was called up before day haveing been up a portion of the night Father changed for worse and at 8 A.M. breathed his last without a Strugle a number of the Brethering and Sisters being presant I rode to the city with Uncle [Samuel] the team went too allso Some of the folks allso to fix for burial returned home as Soon as pofsable packed him in Ice for to keep him in a good State of preservation untill Monday Esther [John's second wife, age 44 then] and Heber [age 18]

and John's oldest son by the third wife, Mary Turpin] got home in after noon All felt bad to loose a Father and friend But in hopes to live so as to meet him again

<u>S</u> 2 Fixing for to hold the funeral under the Shade of trees that had planted out grown big ameong hf [enough] for to Shade a great many people Bro Spencers & John & helping a great many people went to the City for to attend Pres B Young funirel it being in the New Tabernackle and a very large congragation in attendence (next day) Bp Hunter & Wife stoped at Fathers place could attend the funeral

Mon 3 At half past 9 the people gethered for funeral Survases a large nomber of assembled for to pay their last respects to him Bros Angus Cannon Teasdale and Bp Gardner delivered the funeral Survases made many good remarks all regretted for to lay one away in the active part of life Had many friends and family left behind At 11 A.M. Started to Salt Lake Cimetry John R [Samuel's oldest son and Samuel R.'s cousin, age 37] drove the carriage with the corps in 40 Carriages and Wagons followed him to his resting place

<u>Tus 4</u> Drove beef and titheing Cattle to the city Sold 7 head to J. Cook and five for titheing Some Jents trying for to bargain for our Cattle

Wed 5 Threashing at Fathers rather a difsagreeable day for me

Thurs 6 Threashing Lucern at Fathers place and Jobing around Esther, Heber Started back to Rush Willey & Mark went to Camp Floyd after the old Sharp bull and fetch a load of posts home

Fri 7 Took my titheing wool and Fathers Wheat to the city Harden, Hyrum Started for Castle Vally Jinney with them to Lehi first day

<u>Sat 8</u> Drove the Market waggon to the City Mary and Mother with me paid Fathers funeral expences and for part of a lot for burial with Uncle Samuel.

Poems by Esther Ann Birch

Esther Ann Birch, the second wife of John Bennion, was born in England in 1833. Following the examples of her two older married sisters, she joined the LDS Church in 1852 at age eighteen. Three years later she emigrated to Salt Lake City with two of her girl friends, arriving in the Salt Lake Valley in September, 1855. She found work as a housekeeper until her marriage to John on July 20, 1856. We are not certain of how John and Esther Ann became acquainted, but it appears that it was mostly after their marriage! Apparently Brigham Young played an important role in arranging the marriage, as the ceremony was performed by him in his office, and John's first wife Esther Wainwright didn't meet Esther Ann until after the marriage. In any case, she became the mother of eight Bennion boys and one Bennion girl. In 1893 she was selected as one of Utah's three most outstanding poets, and some of her work was included in a book of Utah poems for the Chicago World's Fair the following year.

One of her esteemed granddaughters, Eileen Bennion McKean, is compiling a book of all of Esther Ann's surviving poems. It will be a treasure for all of Esther Ann's descendants, but it needs to be as complete as possible. Below is a list of all of Esther Ann's poems which are in Eileen's possession. 
Recollections of Angeline Bennion Spencer

As part of her research for her forthcoming book on Samuel Bennion, Helen Madsen has examined all the journals of all the families that traveled across the plains with Samuel and John Bennion's families. During that process, Helen came across the following commentary from Angeline Bennion Spencer. Angeline was born March 16, 1847 in Garden Grove, Iowa, as her parents, John and Esther Wainwright Bennion, were crossing the plains. Angeline therefore crossed the plains herself as a babe in arms and later, in about 1925, recounted this story, which is found in the Mormon Biographical Sketches Collection located in the LDS Church Archives. The pig incident apparently occurred sometime in the 1850's. There are a couple of inconsistencies in Angeline's recollection (she was close to 80 years old when she recounted this), like the fact that Rachel was her younger sister and born in Utah, while Mary was her older sister. But we are nevertheless grateful for the preservation of the story!

" My parents after described our trip across the plains. We had two wagons, the first of which pulled by oxen, was driven by my father, and second drawn by a yoke of oxen and a yoke of cows, by my mother. My five year old brother, Samuel R. Bennion, who died ten years ago, rode a mare with a colt. He was such a little fellow that he kept slipping off, but then my father would stop and help him back on and the train would go on. My older sister, Rachel Bennion, then about four, rode in the wagon Ann, who was only two, contracted a fever from which she died and we buried her at Sweetwater. Wyoming. We arrived in the valley on the fifth of October [1847].

"I remember a great big pig that crossed the plains with us. My mother [Esther

Wainwright Bennion] had left the house for just a few minutes to find out the time from a neighbor next door. There was washing spread on the grass to dry. My sister and I were playing in the house. I was about three and Rachel was seven. Suddenly the pig came saddling in the house, seized Rachel by the shoulder, and dragged her out into the yard. I ran alongside the pig, beating him with a club and screamed at the top of my voice. Though there were several men in the yard, my mother reached us first. I shall never forget that."

President's Corner

Four years ago we adopted a revised
Bennion Family Constitution, which called for
the President of the Bennion Family
Association to be rotated every two years.
The purpose for the two year rotation was to
allow the president to energetically pursue the
goals of the family association in his/her own
creative manner for two years, then to give
that opportunity to another.

As my two year service draws to a close, I'd like to share my thoughts about the Bennion Family. My primary emotion is one of gratitude. As I learn about Samuel and John and their families, I am overwhelmed by their devotion to their wives and children, to each other's families, and to the gospel of Jesus Christ. I am grateful for the journals and letters that they wrote and others preserved, that we might be better acquainted with them. It has increased my personal motivation for keeping a journal.

I'm grateful for my association with the wonderfully dedicated members of the Bennion Family Executive Committee. The President and Vice President come and go every two years, but the others stay as long as we can impose upon them! We have a marvelous core group of dedicated workers: Helen Madsen in genealogical research and writing the history of Samuel; Ruth Rogers in writing our new volume 4 about John and his wives and children; Steve Bennion and the mammoth task of maintaining the computerized family records; Dave Sharp and the Association finances: and Eileen McKean in taking the minutes, mailing the Recorders, and making us all feel appreciated.

This seems to be a good moment to reflect on the objectives of the Bennion Family Association and see how we're doing. According to our consitution, the objectives are to:

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- 1) Promote and coordinate genealogical research of our Bennion ancestors and their families:
- 2) Encourage temple work for our Bennion ancestors and their families;
- 3) Compile and make available personal and family histories of our Bennion ancestors and their families:
- 4) Encourage the formation of and maintain contact with Bennion family groups organized at lower levels of the family tree (e.g. grandparent organizations).
- 5) Maintain contact with all living descendants of John Bennion (1786-1846), to encourage participation in the achievement of the above objectives.

I think we've made some progress in most of these areas over the past 2 years:

- 1) Temple work was performed for about 100 ancestors, thanks largely to Helen Madsen untiring efforts;
- 2) Bennion Family Volume 4 the History of John Bennion was published, thanks largely to Ruth Rogers;

- 3) Computerized version of the family tree was made available for distribution;
- 4) The <u>Bennion Family Recorder</u> was published, which has hopefully aroused an interest in the family and a commitment to the principles that guided the lives of our ancestors.


My biggest disappointment has been a failure to recruit a larger portion of the family to be involved in Family History projects. Our repeated general requests for volunteers via Recorder announcements have not yielded much. The current committed group cannot sustain the entire family research efforts indefinitely, and they need help! Call them up and volunteer for a two-year stint. Try it, you'll like it!!

Thank you for the opportunity to serve. As a new LDS Bishop with a seventh little Bennion child newly arrived and a career that requires extensive travel, I'm ready to pass the Bennion baton on to someone else. But in the immortal words of Arnold Schwarzeneggar, "I'll be baaaack!"


